OCCA hires next Executive Director

OCCA announced it has hired Morgan Cowling as its next Executive Director, effective January 1, 2022. Her contract was approved by the OCCA Executive Committee on Oct. 6, 2021. Morgan will replace current Executive Director Dr. Cam Preus, who will retire in December 2021 after three years at OCCA. Morgan, a native Oregonian selected from a national pool of applicants, comes to OCCA from the Oregon Coalition of Local Health Officials (CLHO), where she has served as the Executive Director and advocated on behalf of local public health departments for 11 years. Before working for CLHO, Cowling was the Health and Human Services Policy Manager at the Association of Oregon Counties and advocated in the Oregon Legislature on behalf of county commissioners in the areas of mental health, public health, seniors, children and families. No vaccine mandate for community colleges - yet

OCCA Senior Policy Advisor & General Counsel Karen Smith told the OCCA Board that Gov. Kate Brown has not yet declared a mandate for vaccinations for community college employees and/or students. Karen said the state is likely waiting for further guidance from the federal-level vaccine mandates on businesses before making any decisions.

New Laws of Interest

SB 554 Firearms Bill – The bill includes the provision for boards to pass a policy to prohibit all firearms on campus. This is the first time that the legislature has passed the authority directly to boards. In the past District Attorneys would not enforce board policies on firearms; this bill gives law enforcement the authority to enforce the board policy. Karen Smith is working on a memo of what is required from a board and sample language for the policy. She does expect this bill to be challenged (coming to voters most likely in November 2022).

HB 3071 Mandatory Reporting – This bill makes all elected officials statewide mandatory reporters for both elder and child abuse starting January 1, 2022. Online training from DHS available at https://www.oregon.gov/dhs/ABUSE/Pages/mand atory_report.aspx

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DID YOU KNOW?

Corequisite math has been shown to help all students and is particularly supportive for students who have been underserved by our educational system. This includes students of color and economically disadvantaged students who are placed in remedial prerequisites at disproportionately high rates. Corequisites are an alternative to traditional developmental education that have been shown to increase pass rates and improve equitable outcomes. Research shows they help college students graduate on time and with less debt.
