Finding Your Way to Sunshine

Public decisions in Oregon are made in public.

- Not a public participation law.
- Public comment allowed with limits.



- Community College Governing Boards 7 members
 - A Quorum is 4 members
 - Action Requires at Least 4 members
- Authority to take action lies in Board, not individual board members



Changes to OR Public Meetings Law

HB 2560 (2021) - Publicly Accessible Meetings

- Public must be allowed to access and attend the meeting "to extent reasonably possible" by phone, video, or other electronic or virtual means.
 - This requirement does NOT apply to executive session.

HB 2805 (2023) - Enforcement and New Training Requirements

- Adds new definitions for "convening" and "deliberation" to clarify law.
- Public complaint process is created, and Oregon Government Ethics Commission given authority to enforce public meeting laws.
- Training required for board members at least once during term of office.

SB 1502 (2024) – Post Video Recordings of Public Meetings on Website

Applies to school districts, ESDs, community colleges, and public universities – January 1, 2025

Managing Public Comments

- Adopt a policy or procedure on public participation during regular meetings.
 - Set time, place, and manner limits on public comments
 - Time limits e.g. 3 minutes
 - Sign up prior for in-person and on-line commenters
 - Consolidate comments if all saying the same thing
 - Limit comments to agenda topics
- Listen attentively but do not respond to commenters.
- Allow Board Chair to manage public comment period. Be prepared in advance.
- Set an example by how you engage with each other in your discussions.

How to Avoid a Meeting That Goes Viral

- Remember your role. You set the tone for the College community.
 - Students, employees, faculty, and community members are watching.
- Discuss and establish Code of Conduct for board members every year.
 - Check in regularly and evaluate yourselves.
- No surprises!
 - Give a heads up to the Board Chair and President BEFORE the meeting.
- Bring your perspective to the discussion BUT speak with one voice after the vote is taken.
