Oregon Coast Advanced Technology & Trades Center

- Architect selected in January (GLAS/Hacker)
- Original budget \$41.1M; now approx. \$46.7M
 - Due to Moody's bond rating, favorable market conditions at time of bond sales
- First in-person community focus groups conducted; robust local interest, esp. in programs expanding Pre-Apprenticeship for the Construction Trades and broad, generalized industrial training.
- Invitation made to Fishing Fleet for similar planning session; date and format pending.



OCAATT Update

Oregon Coast Advanced Technology & Trades Center

- Groundbreaking as early as September 2025, to begin site prep
- Timber harvests may begin sooner
- Renovation/modernization projects also approved by voters in May '24 will begin Summer 2025

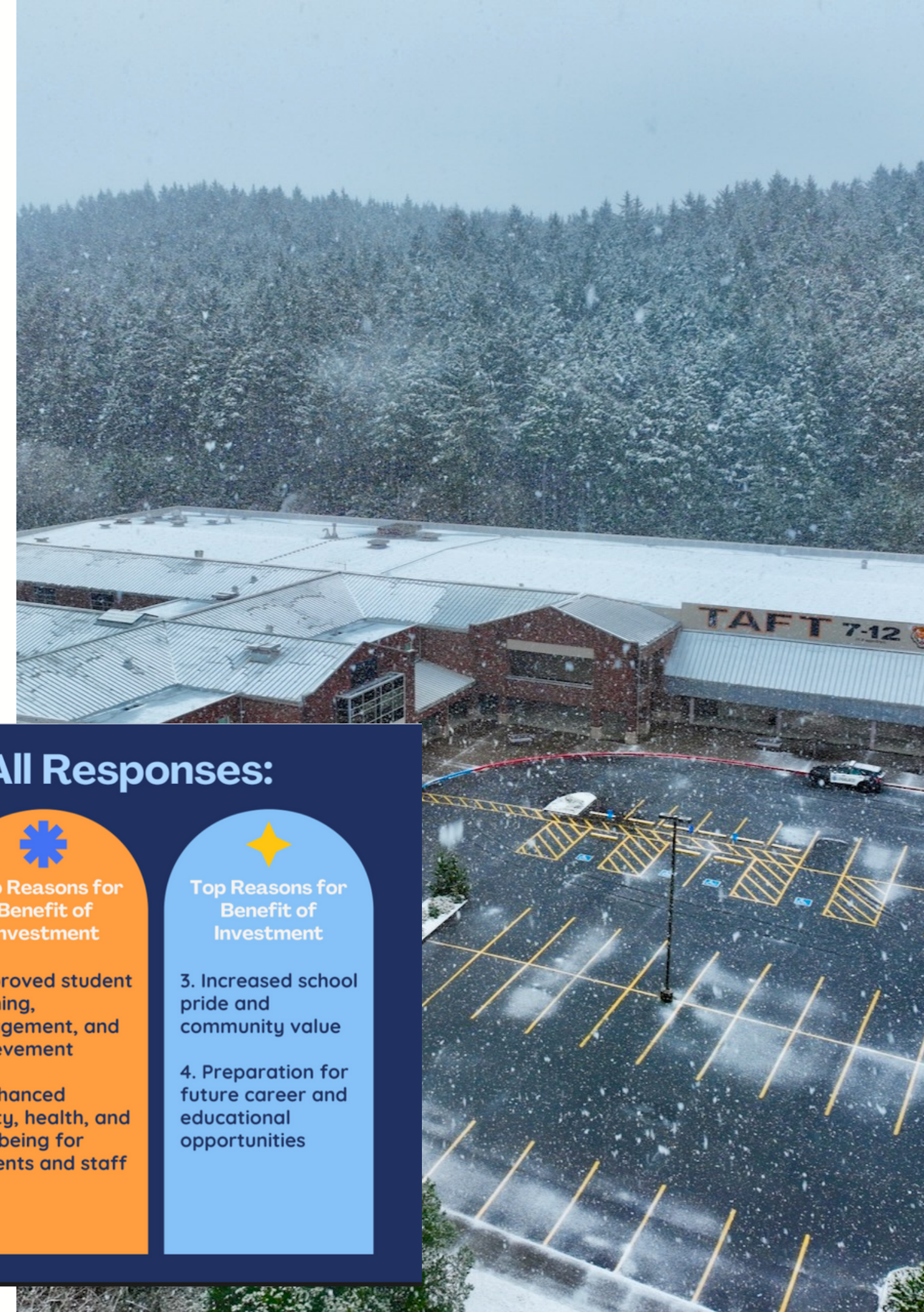
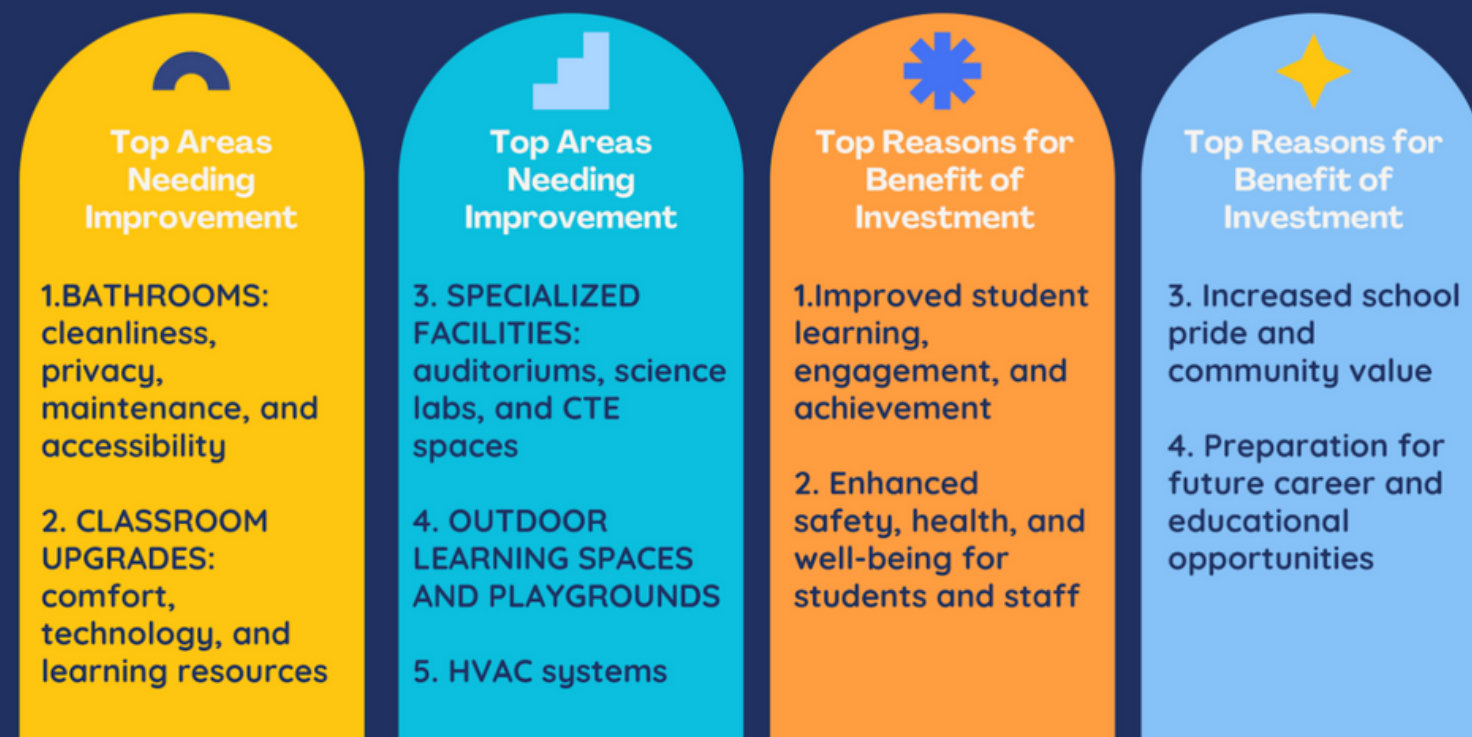


Feb. 11, 2025: Board Votes *to Place Facility Bond on May Ballot*

Bond Includes:

- **Safety and Security:** Lockdown buttons and features, upgraded security equipment and technology, private bathroom facilities
- **Repair:** Roofing, exterior and interior painting, building integrated systems
- **Education Quality:** CTE enhancements, performing arts spaces, outdoor play structures and fields, classroom technology upgrades

Dual Enrollment

GROWTH & OVERVIEW



What is it?

- Courses taught at the College (or online) by college instructors.
- Six terms of one tuition-free course per term
- Any additional course a student takes is 50% off tuition
- Student pays fees and materials
- Wider variety of course offerings (examples)

Who?

- Any Junior or Senior in Lincoln County including homeschool students.



Early College

Student Success

- 84 Junior and Seniors in 2023–2024
- 1130 Credits Earned
- 3.4 average GPA

Savings for students

- \$138,990



Dual Credit

What is it?

- Courses taught in the high school by high school teachers.
- Same information as College courses, but higher frequency of classes and slower pacing.
- Often foundational requirements: math, writing or career and technical education courses.

Who?

- Any LCSD high school student.



Dual Credit

Student Success

- 260 students
- 2098 Credits Earned
- 3.4 average GPA

Savings for students

- \$258,054



Students Participate in Both Programs

Students have utilized both programs to accomplish amazing things:

- Graduate high school with an Associate Degree
- Complete the pre-requisites to the AAS Nursing program.
- Students who have participated in Dual Credit and Early College are more likely to do well in their first year of college.
- Students who have participated in Dual Credit and Early College are more likely to have completed their college-level math and writing requirements- making them more likely to graduate with a college degree.
