AACC makes call for action to close achievement gap

In February, ACCT, AACC, and Higher Ed for Higher Standards released a report titled <u>Seizing the Moment</u>. The report highlights the work community colleges must do to close the preparation gap that leaves so many incoming students behind academically.

A closer collaboration between community colleges and K-12 school systems is an essential component in the strategy to increase the preparedness of students entering higher education institutions and, ultimately, to successfully completing a postsecondary degree.

Governor announces membership of new Council on Educator Advancement

Governor Brown announced the members of the new Council on Educator Advancement that will focus on fostering teaching excellence and cultivating a culturally competent educator workforce in Oregon.

The Council is charged with recommending key strategies to the Governor for ensuring Oregon's educators have access to mentoring, specialized professional learning, and opportunities for leadership development.

"We all want Oregon's students to learn from caring, competent, and culturally responsive educators," <u>Governor Brown said</u>. "The Council's efforts will help ensure educators have meaningful opportunities to expand their skills and capacity to pursue ongoing professional learning and leadership development."

The Council has until September 1, 2016 to report written findings and recommendations to the Governor.

The gap widens

A <u>recently released study</u>, <u>Rising Tide II: Do Black Students Benefit as Grad Rates Increase?</u>, examines a decade of graduation rates at public, four-year institutions that have improved student success over the years.

The study finds that, among institutions that have improved overall graduation rates from 2003 to 2013, 53 percent of institutions did not make the same gains for black students as they did for white students.

Alarmingly, at some institutions, the achievement gaps between white students and black students have actually widened. Moreover, at almost one-third of the postsecondary institutions that improved overall student success rates, the report found that graduation rates for black students were flat or declining.

The report also features initiatives at several institutions that have been successful at both raising the graduation rates for all students while also closing the completion gap between black students and white students. One such effective initiative has been advising and mentoring services that create a continuous line of support for black students. Though, the report reiterates what many already know: there is no "silver bullet" when it comes to improving student success rates and closing the gap between racial groups.
